### **Downtown Day Another Success**







# THE WAY WE WERE:



Part of the library display: pieces of clay pipes, children's marbles, buttons, a broken china doll's head, . . .


Historical Society members Don McLeod. Dennis Gannon and Paul Hutchinson spent part of the summer of '94 by undertaking a highly informal "archaeological dig." Week after week they eyed the surface of what became a virtual mountain at the corner of Centre and Academy streets, a mountain composed of backfill dirt removed from along St. Paul and King streets as the MTO site was excavated in downtown St. Catharines. Don, the sharpesteyed of the three, someone with prior experience on a real archaeological dig, pointed out that the backfill material was liberally scattered with all sorts of artifacts and other objects, things that soon stimulated their imaginations because of the clues they offered about how people in 19th century St. Catharines lived.

What kinds of things are we talking about? Many fragments of pottery and chianaware, many bottle fragments (even some complete bottles) . . . clay pipes . . . clay and stone marbles . . . broken doll's heads . . . buttons . . . building materials like slate and mottled red and white sandstone (the kind used to build such distinguished structures of the 1870's as St. Thomas' Church and the Grand Opera House).

Some readers by now may be wondering how this article snuck into the pages of this newsletter of the HISTORICAL Society of St. Catharines. Is this history? Wouldn't this have been more appropriate in the pages of some archaeological publication? Or a bottle collector's catalogue?

We think this tale of our summertime diversions in the dirt of Olde St. Catharines DOES embody a kind of history. True, it's not one of the kinds of history that we are more used to. It's not **political history**, the kind that focuses on questions like "Who was the first mayor of St. Catharines" or "When was Regional Government established?" Nor is it **economic history**, dealing with questions like "When did the Welland Canal first open to traffic?" or "When did General Motors establish itself in St. Catharines?"

Instead, what we have here is a somewhat diffuse relative of those kinds of history. It's **social history**, which focuses on the day-to-day details of how individuals lived their lives a century or more ago. What did people wear? What did they eat? How did they spend their leisure time? What were their houses made of?

How far back in our history are we going? An 1837 map of St. Catharines shows that development had gone well eastward along St. Paul street, so it is likely that it reached the block bounded by St. Paul, Academy, King and Carlisle by sometime in the 1840's. The "Marcus Smith Map" (left) shows that the area from which this MTO backfill came was well settled by 1852.

Do the artifacts reflect this? Many fragments of the chinaware can be dated to the period 1820-1850. Clay tobacco pipes were in use up until the 1880's.

The artifacts we found stimulated our historical imaginations. You hold in your hand the broken stems from clay pipes. One is

marked "Murray . . . Glasgow," another simply "Scotland." The maker's mark on the bottom of a chinaware plate proclaims that it was made by "W. & E. Corn," a firm in Staffordshire, England. Suddenly your imagination conjures up a vision of a sailing ship under billowing canvas, or an early steamship chugging across the North Atlantic, bringing the people of Canada those little clay pipes and the glistening chinaware.

Surely the most evocative finds were the very few items that bore merchants' marks from right here in St. Catharines -- some druggists' bottles and one piece of grocery store crockery. "Arthur Jukes and Company, The Dispensary" . . . "James N. Walker, Chemist and Druggist" . . . "Flynn Bros. Grocers" . . . . . . "Harry Southcott, Dispensing Chemist" . . . "Mack's Mineral Springs Water" -- all are identifiable local firms, some in business as far back as the 1870's, others as recent as the 1930's.

Looking at the bigger picture, the volume and variety of things found showed that we were looking back to an era before organized disposal of household rubbish. Put it in the blue box to be hauled out to the Glenridge Landfill? No. Just dump the old bottles and pottery shards into a hole in the garden or down the good ol' privy pit. Out of sight, out of mind! And if some of these things might come to light again in the mid-1990's, . . . well, that's not the problem of someone in the 1890's!

With the encouragement and cooperation of librarians Gail Benjafield and Ruth Payne we have mounted a small display in the Special Collections Room of the Centennial Library. If you're curious about what we found, drop by the Library the next time you're downtown and have a look. We hope that the items on display will stimulate your imaginations as much as they did ours about "the way we were."

## Grantham, Lincolnshire, England

Grantham is located on the River Witham, on the border with Leicestershire, in a largely agricultural region. The Town was on the old stagecoach route between London and Lincoln and was once a major railway junction. Grantham is noted as the birthplace of Britain's first woman Prime Minister, Margaret Thatcher, born here in 1925, who became Prime Minister in 1979. Another famous son of Grantham was the scientist Isaac Newton who was born in Grantham in 1642. Grantham was sacked in 1461 at the time of the Wars of the Roses. Richard III signed the instrument of death for the Duke of Buckingham at the 14th-century Angel Inn in 1483. In 1643 Oliver Cromwell made Grantham his headquarters for operations. Its 14th-century church, dedicated to St. Wulfram, has a graceful 282feet spire and is one of the most impressive parish churches in the country. A chained library of 83 books is included in the churches treasures; it was presented to the church in 1598 by a local rector. The 15th-century Grammar School is a superb building; it has a stone tiled roof and fine mullioned windows and on a window-ledge there still remains the carved name of Isaac Newton who was educated here. There is a commemorative statue of Sir Isaac Newton in front of the guildhall. Grantham House is a late 14th-century property that is owned by the National Trust. It has Elizabethan additions and shows enlargements of the 18th-century. The house is set amidst fine parkland. Grantham has a fine collection of buildings from all periods and is an interesting, gracious red brick town that has been at the centre of the Lincolnshire hunting community for centuries and surrounded by countryside of rich pasturelands, sweet meadows and endless twisting narrow lanes.

The Grantham Canal offers many miles of enjoyable waterways that run right through the beautiful Vale of Belvoir. Grantham offers visitors a variety of pleasurable experiences, and there are excellent shopping facilities with antique shops, several noted restaurants and fine historic inns. There is a good museum and nearby Belvoir Castle and Belton House are well worth a visit.

## **Historians Seeking Information on Gun Boats**

Cheryl and Sandra MacDonald are seeking information on gunboats stationed on the Great Lakes between 1866 and 1868. The boats were named the HMG *Heron*, HMG *Britomart* and HMG *Cherub*. The *Britomart* was launched in May 1860; it spent ten days in Port Dalhousie. The *Cherub* was launched in March 1865 and spent one day in Port Dalhousie. The *Heron* was launched in July 1860 and spent six days in Port Dalhousie. They are writing a book on the history of the gunboats and the interaction of the crew with Canadians during this period. ## Welstead Lake, Alberta

Welstead Lake is located approximately 170 km north of Fort McMurray. According to the 1928 edition of *Place Names of Alberta* the lake was named in 1914 after a Reeve of Grantham Township in Ontario. The short entry goes on to say: "Why this name was chosen is not known. Perhaps Mr. Welstead was a friend or relative of the surveyor working in the area." G. Arthur Welstead was Reeve of Grantham Township from 1918 to 1922, which is later than 1914 when the lake was named ... any information on Welstead or his connection with this lake would be appreciated.



### **Old Post Card View of Ontario Street**

This view taken sometime between 1930 and 1945 was taken while standing on Ontario Street just south of Welland Avenue and looking southerly towards Adams Street, essentially where the hospital is today. Notice the rail tracks down the middle of the street and the abundance of trees. The house on the west side or extreme right of picture, marked with an 'X', is the former home of L. L. Drake at 151 Ontario Street who resided there from about 1930 to about 1945. In this time frame, the next home 149 was the residence of J.D. Chaplin, followed by 147 owned by L.E. Peart. Over 50 years later and according to a 1980 city directory, 151 was the Hotel Dieu Nursing Sisters' Residence, while 149 and 147 was parking for the hospital. After Mr. Drake moved out, 151 was the residence of R.M. Robertson. The former residence of Hamilton K. Woodruff across the street has recently been demolished.

### Minutes of the Annual General Meeting, April 22 2004

Following the business part of the meeting, John Burtniak introduced the speaker for the evening David Murray and his presentation 'Justice and Crime in Early Niagara'



February 24, 2005 - Alun Hughes presented "Captain Dick: Treasure Trove and Toponymic Truth" to approximately 58 in attendance. In his usual professional way, Alun gave us an analysis of Richard Pierpoint's connection to the naming of Dick's Creek and with the use of visual overhead drawings helped to show how this important waterway that runs through south St. Catharines received it's name. The conclusion he made was that the creek was indeed likely named after Mr. Pierpoint.

March 24, 2005 - Our scheduled speaker was unable to attend and a 40-minute video titled "St. Catharines Shipwreck Millennium Project" was shown with the kind permission of Shark Marine Technologies Inc. A donation was made to the Ontario Marine Heritage Committee. The video showed dramatic footage of an unknown early wood masted ship lying on the floor of Lake Ontario just off Port Dalhousie. Techniques of marine research were particularly of interest. Approximately 44 attended.


## **Ontario Heritage Foundation Awards**

At the March 3, 2005 meeting of Regional Council, Regional Chair Partington, together with Mayors Hodgson and Rigby, presented the 2004 Ontario Heritage Foundation Awards. The awards were presented in three categories: Lifetime Heritage Achievement, Natural Heritage and Built Heritage.

The Lifetime Heritage Achievement Award went to Corlene Dwyer Taylor, a lifelong Niagara resident. She was born in "Mayholme" the family homestead on Ontario Street, St. Catharines and is descended from Loyalist families including the May family, original Grantham Township settlers. Corlene recently obtained a heritage designation for "Mayholme" and donated the property and house to the Mayholme Foundation to be used as a repository and library for genealogical and historical research. Corlene received a Life Membership in the Niagara Peninsula Branch of the Ontario Genealogical Society in 1996 for her dedicated work. She is also a long-standing member of the Historical Society of St. Catharines. She compiled a booklet on the "Cemeteries of the Town of Lincoln" and co-authored "The Mini Atlas of Early Settlers in the District of Niagara, 1782 - 1786".

The Natural Heritage Award went to the Board of Directors and Friends of Malcolmson Park. The Park is one of the last remaining large natural areas of St. Catharines. Accepting the award is Mr. and Mrs. Potter.





The Built Heritage Award went to John Wakelin and Pat Forster, the owners of Heritage House Bed and Breakfast at 29 Edmund Street in St. Catharines. The house built in 1870 by Theodore Thompson, a captain in the volunteer militia, has been restored to its original 1870s character.



### Early Governance as it Relates to Grantham Township

The settlement of what is now known as Ontario was precipitated by the declaration of American Independence and subsequently the fall of British rule in what is now the United States of America. Some of those wishing to remain Loyal to the British Crown fled to Fort Niagara. In May of 1781 the British purchased lands on the west side of the Niagara River from the Mississauga Indians. A small number of settlers had settled on the west side in 1780 and this number grew quickly with the land purchase and survey in 1782. In 1783 the Peace Treaty was signed and England officially recognized the U.S.A. The growing number of Loyalists resulted in the purchase of additional lands from Mississauga Indians on May 22, 1784 (and confirmed by a treaty signed on December 7, 1792). It was this second purchase that now allowed settlement in Grantham Township. Soon after the purchase settlers began to make their way into the area that would become Grantham Township. But it wasn't until after the survey undertaken between December 27, 1787 and March 31, 1788 by Daniel Hazen of Township Number 3 (which was later called Grantham Township) that these settlers could claim their land holdings with the Land Board.

During the above time period of 1780 to 1791, the area of Grantham Township was part of the British Province of Quebec and the following were the Governors of the Province of Quebec:

1778 - 1786 - Sir Frederick Haldimand

1786 – 1791 - Sir Guy Carleton, 1st Baron Dorchester (Lord Dorchester)

By proclamation of July 24, 1788 Upper Quebec, now known as Ontario, was divided into four districts for the primary purpose of administering justice and land distribution. The area of Grantham Township would become part of Nassau District.

On June 19,1791 royal assent was given to the Constitutional Act, commonly called the Canada Act, which came into affect by proclamation of August 24, 1791, split the Province of Quebec into Lower Canada and Upper Canada. From December 26, 1791 to February 10, 1841 the area now known as Grantham Township was in the British Province of Upper Canada. The Legislature of 1792 for Upper Canada consisted of 16 representatives elected by the people and the Legislative Council consisted of 7 councillors nominated by the Crown. The capital was at Newark (now Niagara On-The-Lake).

On July 8,1792 John Graves Simcoe was appointed the first Lieutenant-Governor of Upper Canada. He served in this position until 1798, but was in England for the last two years of his term.

On July 19, 1792 a proclamation divided the Province of Upper Canada into 19 counties. The counties would provide a basis for elections, the distribution of lands and organizing the militia. Sixteen representatives were elected to the first Legislative Assembly. Lincoln County was divided into 4 ridings and the first representatives were: Riding #1 - Nathaniel Pettit who also represented York County and Durham County; Riding #2 - Benjamin Pawling; Riding #3 - Isaac Swayze; Riding #4 - Parshall Terry who also represented Norfolk County.

On September 17, 1792 the first parliament of Upper Canada met at Newark. At this first session of the Legislature, the names of the four districts (previously named by Lord Dorchester in 1788) were changed and the Nassau District became the Home District.

On April 9, 1793, there came into operation "An Act to provide for the nomination and appointment of Parish and Town Officers within the Province." The era of town meetings and quarter sessions began and lasted until 1841, when Upper and Lower Canada were reunited. Presumably Grantham Township held meetings starting in 1793, however the records for 1793 – 1817 are lost.

On July 21, 1796, in the absence of Lieutenant-Governor Simcoe, Hon. Peter RUSSELL was appointed President of the Executive council of Upper Canada, a position he held until August 17, 1799. During his term the Provincial offices in Newark closed with the move of the capital to York.

On August 17, 1799 Hon. Peter HUNTER was appointed Lieutenant-Governor and held this position until his death on August 21, 1805. During his term of office, on January 1, 1800 the four districts were revised and the

number of districts expanded, at which time the Home District area was changed and the District of Niagara was created. Niagara consisted of four ridings of Lincoln and Haldimand.

In 1800 the following officials of Niagara District are known: Clerk of the Peace – Ralfe Clench; Sherriff – James Clark; District Court Judge – William Dickson; Surrogate Court Judge – Dr. Robert Kerr.

In the absence of a Lieutenant-Governor, the head of state from September 11, 1805 – August 25, 1806 was Hon. Alexander GRANT who was President of the Executive Council.

August 25, 1806 – 1812 – the Lieutenant-Governor of the Province of Upper Canada was Hon. Francis GORE. He went to England on leave October 8, 1811 and until his return, the head of state was the administrator or president, which was committed successively to the senior military officer. During Gore's absence, the following served as President Administering the Government of Upper Canada:

- October 9, 1811 killed October 13, 1812 Major-General Sir Isaac BROCK
- October 20, 1812 June 18, 1813 Major-General Sir Roger Hale SHEAFFE, Bart.
- June 19, 1813 December 12, 1813 Major-General Francis Baron de ROTTENBURG
- December 13, 1813 April 13, 1815 Lieut. -Gen. Sir Gordon DRUMMOND, G.C.B.
- April 25, 1815 June 30, 1815 Lieut. -Gen. Sir George MURRAY (Provisional Lieut.-Gov.)
- July 1, 1815 September 21 1815 Maj.-Gen. Sir Frederick Phipps ROBINSON, K.C.B. (Provisional Lieut.-Gov.)
- \* Francis Gore returned September 1815 and left the country again on June 11, 1817.
- June 11, 1817- August 13, 1818 Hon. Samuel SMITH

August 13, 1818 – November 4, 1828 - Maj.-Gen. Sir Peregrine MAITLAND, K.C.B. served as Lieutenant-Governor of Upper Canada. Following the death of the Duke of Richmond, Maitland served as administrator of Lower Canada between March 8 and June 30, 1820. During his absence Hon. Samuel SMITH acted as the administrator of Upper Canada.

From November 5, 1828 until he resigned and relieved on January 25, 1836 the Lieutenant-Governor was Maj. Gen. Sir John COLBORNE, K.C.B., later Baron Seaton.

From accession on January 25, 1836 until March 23, 1838 the Lieutenant-Governor was Maj. Sir Francis Bond HEAD, K.C.B.

From accession on March 23, 1838 until February 10, 1841 the Lieutenant-Governor was Maj. Gen. Sir George ARTHUR, K.C.B.

Grantham Township records from 1818 to 1900 can be found in the Special Collections area of the St. Catharines Public Library. These records list the following Township Clerks as of the first meeting in January of each year: 1818 – 1819 - William CHISHOLM; 1820 – Samuel WOOD; 1821-1842 – Charles ROLLS.

In 1841 the "District Councils Act" was passed and continued through 1849.

Between February 10, 1841 and June 30, 1867 Upper and Lower Canada became the united Province of Canada. Upper Canada became known as Canada West. The first Governor of the Province of Canada was Lord Sydenham who served in that capacity from February 10, 1841 until his death on September 19, 1841. His death prompted the appointment of Sir Richard Downes Jackson as Administrator until Sir Charles Bagot was appointed Governor on January 12, 1842 and he served until March 30, 1843. He died at Kingston on May 19, 1843. Following Bagot as governor was Sir Charles Metcalf from March 30 to November 26, 1845. Lord Cathcart was then appointed Administrator on November 26, 1845 and governor on April 24, 1846 and served until January 30, 1847. Lord Elgin was governor from January 30, 1847 until December 19, 1854.

In 1849 the "Baldwin Municipal Act" was passed which provided for the creation of municipal councils.

Thus on January 1, 1850 Grantham Township was incorporated and Township Council was elected. The council members then elected a Reeve from the council members. The first Reeve was John Gilleland. A complete list of Grantham Township Reeves from 1850 to 1900 can be found in the Society's *March 2005 newsletter*.

# Society Member Profiles: Herb Harder


Herb Harder was born in the free city of


