Our Society recently received a new member in the Allen County Public Library in Fort Wayne, Indiana, U.S.A. The Library also purchased a copy of our Spa Book, and have requested that we send them ALL back issues of our newsletter, which they want to bind together and place within their collections. If you have copies of newsletters prior to 1995, please contact me so that I can copy them, and we shall also be keeping a set for ourselves. The Allen County Public Library has developed a world renowned genealogy and history collection which attracts people from all over North America who are searching for their ancestors. It has become a destination! It was recently pictured and mentioned in the May/June 2000 issue of the Family Chronicle Magazine.

In 1993 the St. Catharines Public Library won the Award of Merit from the Ontario Genealogical Society for the Special Collections area of the library. However, instead of capitalizing upon this award, and moving forward and creating an even greater collection and attracting even more people into Special Collections, the library facing budget restraints actually ended up downgrading this area. John and Charles RIORDON of St. Catharines

Physician Dr. Jeremiah and Amelia (AMES) RIORDON brought their family of six children from Ireland to Weston, Ontario c1849/50. This article pertains to two of the children, sons John (born c1834 in Limerick, Ireland) and Charles (born November 28, 1847 in County Kerry, Ireland).

Subsequently the family, except for John moved to Rochester, New York. John moved to Brantford and became a dry goods dealer and in 1857 owned a general store there. He apparently dabbled in papermaking in Brantford before packing up and moving to St. Louis, Missouri, U.S.A. in about 1858 to open a store there. The outbreak of the American Civil War in 1861 saw John move back to Canada by February of 1862 when he came to Hamilton. By 1863 the St. Catharines City Directory shows him living on Yates Street near Salina St. and occupation as paper manufacturer. He had constructed a papermaking factory in Centreville (now Merritton area of St. Catharines) on the East Side of the Welland Canal on the former site of the Whitman and Barnes Knife Works. He leased the site below Lock 6 from Thomas R. Merritt for about \$400 a year and this included some water rights. Production was underway on 31 July 1863. With his business underway, he sent word to his younger brother, 15 year old Charles in Rochester, New York to come to Niagara to work at the paper mill. Charles had settled in Rochester with other RIORDON family members. Charles heeded his brother's call and became the factory manager, leaving John to sell the products. Charles also took up residence on Yates Street at the corner of Cherry Alley. In 1866, Charles went to England to purchase new modern equipment for a mill in Merritton, which soon began producing paper from rags and straw. By 1868 the mill was using wood pulp. Continuous modernization kept the Riordon Mills profitable and a leader in mass production of newsprint. The mill by 1869 was the main supplier to Toronto Globe and had begun selling newsprint to many newspapers in eastern Canada. In 1870 the original mill was sold to Collinson and Burch and became what is known as the Knife Works. A new mill had been constructed on lands likely purchased by RIORDON. The 1871 census gives John's age of 37 years, born in Ireland, religion as Church of England (Anglican) and an occupation of manufacturer of paper. On June 1, 1874 John made his brother Charles a partner. The 1874 Directory shows John living at 17 Geneva Street (today the site of the Garden City Arena) and Charles now living at 108 Church Street. On the 3rd of June 1876 Charles and his wife Edith Susan (ELLIS) had a son Carl born in St. Catharines. In 1877 The Toronto Mail could not pay the Merritton Paper Mill about \$26,000 it owed. As the main creditor, John RIORDON took over the Mail newspaper in lieu of the debt and became the publisher. He also purchased shares in the Hamilton Spectator. In 1879 John Riordon, a Conservative Party supporter, sought a Senate seat but was refused by Prime Minister Sir John A. Macdonald. In 1882 life would change very quickly for John, when an accident with his horse resulted in a serious head injury. By the autumn of 1882 John had retired from business and transferred control of the mills and newspapers to his brother Charles. John, his wife and son John left St. Catharines to travel the Near East and Europe. In May of 1883, while in Venice, Italy, John took a turn for the worse and the family moved to St. Leonard's, East Sussex, England, where John died Sunday, 21 September 1884 at the age of 51 years. He was a selfmade millionaire. The following is an article which appeared in the November 14, 1884 edition of the *Thorold Post* newspaper titled "A Millionaire's Estate - the last will and testament of the late Mr. John RIORDON" and reads as follows: "Mr. Riordon's estate both real and personal is valued at not less than a million. The personality has been sworn under \$469,000. The residence in St. Catharines with all the household furniture, &c. is devised to Mrs. Riordon, the testator's widow, and an annuity of \$12,000 a year is bequeathed to her for her life. The testator has bequeathed considerable legacies to each of his sisters, Mrs. W.J. Douglas and Mrs. J. Carlisle. And also to Mrs. Misener, of Buffalo, a sister of Mrs. Riordon. His old servant, John Green, who was in his service 20 years, receives \$2000. One half of all the mill property at Merritton is given to Mr. Charles RIORDON, brother of the testator; and the remainder of the estate to Mr. John RIORDON, the only child of the deceased, who comes into full enjoyment of his inheritance when he attains the age of 25 years. In the meantime he

will receive an annuity of \$4000 per annum. Mrs. Riordon and Mr. Charles Riordon are appointed executors."

Charles RIORDON meanwhile, had been appointed in 1882 as a director of the Niagara Falls Suspension Bridge Co. His son Carl was attending Upper Canada College between 1887 and 1890. In 1889, Charles helped to found Bishop Ridley College in St. Catharines and Carl returned home to attend classes there from 1890 to 1892. After John's accident, improvements continued at the paper mill and in 1890 digesters had been installed to produce sulphite pulp. In 1895 Charles bought the Toronto newspaper The Empire and merged it with The Mail to form the Mail and Empire. In 1896 Charles' son Carl joined the business after graduating from the University of Toronto. The 1898 City Directory shows 4 Riordon members (C.Edith, Carl, Elsie and Kathleen) living at "Woodlawn" on Geneva Street, Carl married Amy Louise Paterson (daughter of Rev. Charles W. Paterson of Port Hope) in St. Catharines on 23 June 1900. Carl became managing director in 1905. Carl and Amy had a son John Eric Benson RIORDON born in St. Catharines in 1906 and the family moved to Montreal in 1908. Business expansion between 1909 and 1920 saw the acquisition of several businesses in Ontario and Quebec. The older Mill in Merritton was shut down in the fall of 1920. A depression in 1921 resulted in a decline in sales and a sell off of assets. Charles RIORDON moved to Montreal, Quebec where he died on August 17, 1931 aged 81 years. At a Service on 18 September his ashes, along with the ashes of his wife, who had pre-deceased him 3 years earlier, were placed into a family vault in Mount Pleasant Cemetery in Toronto. The service was officiated by Dr. J.O. Miller, former head of Ridley College and attended by his son Carl RIORDON and Messrs. H.S.HOWARD and W. DOUGLAS and George and Sidney BUNTING.

Carl's son John studied the arts in Montreal and went to Paris in 1932 to train at the Grande Chaumiere and Academie Julian, then traveled and painted extensively in Europe. He returned to Montreal and visited the family cottage in the Laurentians north of Mont Tremblant at LacLache. In 1940 he joined the R.C.N.V.R. and became a Lieutenant. At the end of the war he held the rank of lieutenant-commander in the Naval Reserve. His art features many naval and landscape paintings and he had several shows of his works. He died in 1948 leaving his wife Mollie and two sons Eric and Michael, his parents, and two brothers Hal and Peter and two sisters Mrs. Peter Bennett and Mrs. Gordon Forbes and other more distant relatives.

Some miscellaneous information found:

Augustus RIORDON brother of Charles RIORDON of St. Catharines died in San Diego California on July 10, 1915 at the age of 68 years. The funeral was in Toronto.

Some questions:

When and whom did John marry? And what happened to their son John? Did they stay in Sussex and where are they buried? John left money to his 2 sisters ... why not to his other brothers?



Our 5th Annual Heritage Bus Tour (Saturday, June 17)


Photos from the Merritt's Birthday Celebration held on July 1st

WILLIAM HAMILTON MERRITT 1793-1862


A pioneer in the field of transportation. Merritt was born in Bedford. New York and settled at Twelve Mile Creek (St. Catharines) with his Loyalist family in 1796. He served with the provincial cavalry during the War of 1812, then operated mercantile and milling enterprises here. Primarily responsible for the construction of the first Welland Canal (1824-53). Merritt worked tirelessly to promote this ambitious venture, both by raising funds and by enlisting government support. During his long tenure in the Legislative Assembly (1852-60) he championed freer trade policies and various transportation projects. In particular he advocated building a comprehensive system of canals and railways linking inland waters with the ocean, a scheme which foreshadowed the opening of the St. Lawrence Seaway over 100 years later.


Despite living in Port Dalhousie for most of my life. I have never had the occasion to see the inside of the inner range lighthouse. That is until July 26 when I met Bruce Colbey and his crew from Wayside House busily working on the restoration. The picture shows their progress as of July 26. I have taken the liberty to reprint the adjoining article from the St. Catharines Heritage Committee's newsletter The Scribe which outlines the project. I was able to climbed the 49 risers to the ton and experience the views of the harbour from an entirely new vantage point. In 1999 the Friends of the Lighthouse spearheaded a proposal to restore and reuse the Inner Range Lighthouse in Port Dalhousie. The project has received Millennium Funding from the federal



government. As well, a number of community partners have committed money, supplies and/or services-in-kind for the project.

Lest We Forget!

The St. Catharines Cenotaph is located on the west-side of St. Paul St. between the Burgoyne Bridge and Ontario St. The inscriptions on it read as follows: (front face) "The men were very good unto us and we were not hurt they were a wall unto us both by night and day" "In Memoriam / Requiescant In Pace" "1939-World War II-1945" "1914-World War I-1928" "1950-Korea-1953" (north side face) PASSCHENDAELE - AMIENS -ARRAS -SOMME -VIMY - 1914-1918 (south side face) St. .JULIAN -2nd Battle of YPRES - FESTHUBERT - CAMBRAI - MONS - 1914-1918 (back face) This cenotaph was dedicated on August 7th AD 1927 and the first wreath placed hereon by His Royal Highness Edward Prince Of Wales after the cenotaph had been unveiled by Brigadier General W.B.M. King. C.M.G.D.S.O.
