Eliza in 1839; he had a second wife by 1844: Jane ______; Thomas died in 1856 and is buried in Victoria Lawn Cemetery. Trying to find the parents or siblings of William ROE born May 19, 1843 in Port Dalhousie (now St. Catharines), Ontario. His obituary states that his parents were English and that he was a member of the Episcopal Church. The family bible has pictures that make reference to ANDERSON and SCOTT cousins. He immigrated to the US in 1864. He was married to Alice Elizabeth McBride on May 1, 1872 in Seneca, Pennsylvania. There they raised the following children: Minnie (Hoskins), Grace (Ridgway), Florence (Olson), Jennie (Wheeler), George, Agnes (Freeman), and Lawrence. William made his living in the oil business, as a tank builder, and as a farmer. He moved with his wife to Iola, Kansas to be closer to children about 1917. William died on October 21, 1923 and didn't bother telling anyone about his life. If anyone has any information, please contact us. My grandpa is a curious grandkid of William who would like to know if he has Canadian cousins.

Secure the Shadow ere the Substance Fade A Short Sketch of G.F. Maitland, Photographer

In May 1865, George F. Maitland took over the photographic studio of James Inglis, who had been established upstairs in the Haynes Block (on the site of today's One St. Paul Street) for three years. Maitland was about thirty years old at the time and had worked for five years for R. Milne, photographer, of Hamilton, probably almost from the time of Maitland's emigration from Scotland in 1860. He brought to St. Catharines with him his wife, Mary Ann, four years younger than he, and their two children, Minnie and William. Within months of his arrival, *The Evening Journal*, a St. Catharines daily newspaper, was praising Maitland's work enthusiastically:

Decidedly the finest photographs we have ever seen in this locality are the Prize Photographs, on view at Mr. Maitland's photograph gallery. His pictures are elegantly got up, and for clearness and neatness of finish at once attract the eye. The figures in his portraits seem to stand out in bold relief from the background, resembling statuary more than pictures. Those who require a good picture would do well to give him a call. His charges are reasonable.

Soon, however, Maitland found his photographic rooms inadequate, and, on April 16, 1866, he closed the premises for renovations. Part of the plan was to remove the north wall in the upper flat and replace it with "a mammoth glass frame." In addition, he was to add another skylight to the one already in place in the roof. According to the *Journal*,

This will enable him to take a class of pictures never before attempted in St. Catharines, and in fact he will be enabled to get up life like pictures in every style and finish known to the art. We are glad to notice this evidence of improvement in the picture business, as it shows that Maitland, at least, is alive and kicking, and up to the progress of the times.

The progressive Maitland reopened his rooms on May 4, advertising the premises to be "enlarged and with improved Light."

Even with the additional light in the studio, Maitland was still hampered, as were all photographers of his era, by the long exposure times required for his primitive equipment. He operated only from 9 a.m. to 4 p.m., the prime daylight hours, and suggested, "The best hours for photographing Children are from 11 a.m. to 2 p.m." Part of his enticement to draw subjects into his studio was the slogan "Secure the Shadow ere the Substance fade."

Within a few years, in the summer of 1869, Maitland offered something new to his customers: coloured photographs. For two weeks only, he hired an artist to enhance his prints with water colours. The *Journal* once again was effusive in its praise:

We were yesterday shown, at the studio of Mr. Maitland, Photographic Artist, some specimens of Colored Photographic Portraits, which for real artistic beauty and finish far surpass anything of the kind ever attempted in this town. Two of the specimens shown—leading merchants in town—were remarkably truthful as likeness, while the semi-transparency of the flesh tints and the beautiful blending and delicacy of the half-tints impart to the pictures a stereoscopic relief that at once charms the beholder.

Whether this two-week offer was repeated or extended is unknown, but about two years later, in March 1871, Maitland hired a full-time painter to work with him. This was J.T. See, of the Newman Street Academy, London, England. He coloured photographs with oil paints and retouched negatives. This time Maitland was offering coloured pictures in sizes from cabinet (about 5 x 7 inches) to life size.

One such photograph was of Theodore Pomeroy, of Massachusetts. Maitland shot the picture; then See painted it. They displayed the result in the St. Catharines post office. The *Journal* called See "a most promising and clever artist" and raved about the work of him and Maitland:

The picture is beyond doubt a noble work of art, and reflects a great credit upon the skill of the gentlemen named. Mr. Maitland has also at his studio an array of beautiful photographs, which for softness and delicacy of outline, admirable finish, and general excellence, are equal if not superior to anything in this line we have ever seen. Mr. Maitland has acquired an enviable reputation for the fidelity of his pictures, and it is certainly a "feather in his bonnet" to receive orders from so great a distance. It seems a happy combination of talent, when Mr. Maitland can make a good picture, and Mr. See transfer it in all its beauty on canvas.

Not content to rest with life-sized photographic portraits, Maitland went to the opposite extreme. In July 1872, he was offering cameo pictures, "the latest novelty of the photographic art." Probably See was tinting these, too.

Surprisingly, even though his business seems to have prospered, Maitland decided to leave St. Catharines after less than nine years. He sold out to See, who had become adept at photography and who hired H.C. Munro, of Cincinnati. Munro had been a student in an art school there and was prepared to do the retouching and painting for See, just as See had done for Maitland. On November 1, 1873, See took over the photographic rooms, and Maitland left town.

From St. Catharines, the Maitland family went first, briefly, to Buffalo, New York, and then to Stratford, Ontario, where Maitland continued as a photographer for thirty-four years before selling out and retiring. (Mrs. Maitland, as she had done in the Niagara area, continued to publish poetry under the name M.A. Maitland during the years in Stratford. From the 1860s on, she published many poems in newspapers and magazines and also produced a book of poetry, *Autumn Leaves*. Posthumously, another volume was published, *God Speed the True*.) The Maitlands eventually ended up in St. Mary's, Ontario, where Mrs. Maitland died on February 24, 1919, her husband surviving her.

Society Planning to Celebrate 75th Anniversary in 2002

There were various historical groups in St. Catharines as early as 1863 and perhaps even before this, however in 1927 the Lincoln Historical Society was formed. The Executive in 1927 consisted of: President - F.R. Parnall; Vice Pres.- C.A. Hesson; Secretary – J. Colin Blain; Treasurer – Mrs.J.A. Abbs (resigned) / Gertrude Ball; Curator – C.A. Case; other board members were: Mrs.L. May and W.C. Muir. The Lincoln Historical Society met regularly until 1938 and then lapsed. In 1950 a group of 13 gathered

and reorganized and the Lincoln Historical Society began meeting regularly again. In 1961 the name changed to the St. Catharines and Lincoln Historical Society. In 1970 the group Incorporated as The Historical Society of St.Catharines and has carried on as such to date. This year would be the 50th Anniversary of the re-organization, however after consideration of the various dates it was decided that we should celebrate the 75th Anniversary of the 1927 formation in 2002.

The Old Courthouse

The building at the corner of King and James Streets is most often referred to as the Old Court House. The original portion facing King Street was designed by architect Kivas Tulley and was completed in 1850 and the portion facing James Street was added in 1865. City Council met in the new building as early as January 29,1850. In 1862 it became the County Building when the seat was moved from Niagara-on-the-Lake to St. Catharines. The building eventually became the Court House and was used until 1981. The City is currently undertaking a significant renovation project to repair the roof and cupola. The existing stone balustrade leading to the main entrance is carved to slope with the rise of the steps and believed to be the only one like this in Canada. The Courthouse Building has always been a central focus in the downtown. The Society was most pleased to be the recipient of an electronic image of an old stereoscopic picture of the Court House taken by George Maitland in the early 1870's. The picture below was found in a collection of Maitland pictures by Julian Baker of Hailsham, England, who contacted the Society via our web page. We thank Julian for the five scanned images of various City scenes.
