Report on Past Society Programs

Thursday, November 23 - Show and Tell - A fantastic response! Over 23 items were brought forward, including: pictures of ancestors, an old cash box from a downtown merchant named A. Purves, 3 wood handle axes manufactured locally (one by Tuttle and Bate), a beautiful fan, a land grant certificate to a Fenian Raid participant, a fancy cane, a British Imperial army officers Wilkinson sword from the Boer War, an album containing 55 late 19th century portraits, an 1897 Hungarian china piece, an 1880 cherry pitter, two old books, a souvenir cushion cover c1943 sent home from Halifax during the war, a wood plane once owned by G. Oille a carpenter in the City in 1850's, a snuff box once owned by Richard Secord, a teddy bear with hand made clothing, a rope once used at a local horse show to rope cattle, some Collegiate "Glee Club" memorabilia, a silver locket and picture, and more. Joe Solomon asked if anyone knew where the original picture taken in 1869, showing veterans of the Lincoln Militia from the War of 1812-14 standing in front of Brock's Monument in Queenston Heights Park might be found, as he would like to get a clean copy made to display in the military museum inside Butler's Barracks at Niagara on-the-Lake. Also during the meeting, Judy Sewell from the Children's Discovery Centre made a brief presentation about the progress on this endeavor. The hour went very quickly as John Burtniak moved the session along at a brisk pace. The evening ended with some lovely desserts, refreshments and lots of friendly discussion about the show and tell items. (ed. note: I can't wait for next year!)


Thursday, January 25, 2001 - John Burtniak spoke about his hobby known as Deltiology. John is the Society Vice-President and always presents a fascinating lecture; this presentation was no exception. John spoke about the different ways of collecting post cards, such as particular places, certain time periods, themes such as ships, planes, tourist sites, or funny cards. John used illustrations to show many examples of different post cards. John pointed out, that Post Cards started in Canada when governments issued cards without pictures about 1871. John also shared with the audience of 44 members and guests some of his collections for viewing.

Charles Blisset MILLNER

1805 - 1895 - farmer, teacher, art teacher

Part One - Farmer and Teacher - by Bill Stevens

The information I found on Charles MILLNER was very skimpy in detail and was mainly contained within newspaper extractions. No biography was found, but he did leave behind several pieces of art. I decided to gently edit the information and create a chronology and allow the reader to interpret the life of this gentleman for themselves.

1805 - on 26 November - Charles Blisset Millner - born in Bristol, England.

1820 - about this time, it is believed that Charles, as a teenager, came to St. Catharines

1848 - *St. Catharines Journal* - May 4, 1848

Note that on - 2 inst. (May 2, 1848) Charles Blisse MILLNER, Esq. Miss. Ruth PHIPPS, both of Grantham. - (marriage).

1849 - 1859 - Births and Deaths of their Children -

Between February 1849 and July 1859 the MILLNER's had four children, and sadly, all died young: Isabella was born February 1849 and died March 1850. Shortly after her death Atalanta was born in August 1850, followed by the birth of Angelo in July of 1855. Sadly Atalanta died on September 14, 1857 and Angelo died a few days later on September 26, 1857. The fourth child, Parmmeciano was born July 1859 and died just 3 months later in October.

1855 - page 6 of *John L. Field's Janet Carnochan (Toronto: Fitzhenry & Whiteside Limited, 1985)*: I note the following paragraph - "On 14 October 1856, Janet Carnochan obtained a Certificate of Qualification as a teacher by merely applying for one. The Reverend Mr. Mowat, who was chairman of the local school board, certifying that the applicant was of good moral character, signed it. Mr. C. B. Millner, Superintendent of Common Schools for the nearby Township of Grantham, counter signed the document..."

1863: - *Constitutional*, September 17, 1863: p. 3

"NOTICE - The Board of Public Instruction will attend at the Town Hall of St. Catharines, at 10 o'clock a.m., on Thursday, Oct. 8th, for an Examination of Commons School Teachers. All Teachers and other presenting themselves for Examination must furnish to their Board satisfactory proofs of good moral character.

By order, C.B. MILLNER, Secretary, Sept. 14, 1863.

1865 - *St. Catharines Constitutional* - November 9, 1865 - page 3

Notice of Meeting -for Teacher's Exams ... signed C.B. MILLNER

1867 - *St. Catharines Post*, October 16, 1867, p. 2

letter to the editor about a school examination made of the school at Eight-Mile Creek and taught by J. W. Grote. Mentions 50 pupils were present. Says the "Superintendent" was C. B. Millner

1871 - 1871 *Census Extraction - Grantham - Division 2*

Charles MILLNER, age 60 years, born England, religion Church of England, farmer, married, Ruth MILLNER, wife, age 40 years, born England, religion Church of England.

1873 - *NELSON DuoTang Binder (spec.coll#759.11 HOOR M)* *St. Catharines Public Library*

Marion NELSON - at the age of 13 years began taking art lessons from C.B. MILLNER an English Artist.

1878 - January 18, 1946 *St. Catharines Standard*, page 10

A Photo and write-up of the Staff of Grantham Academy appeared in the newspaper. The picture was shown by Principal W. J. Salter "last night" to the Board of Education. Taken in 1878 it shows the Grantham Academy staff of 1878. The photo caption says the photo includes " ... C. B. Wilner, an old English gentleman who was art teacher; . . ." There are 8 people in the picture. The "WILNER" was actually "MILLNER".

1887-1890 - *City Directory* - MILLNER, C.B., City post office, Conc.4, Lot 15, farmer

1895 - *St. Catharines Standard* - August 12, 1895, page 3

Death Announcement - "C.B. Millner -one of the oldest residents of this section died at home just outside the city on Sunday (August 11) He was in his 90th year. Deceased though of a very retiring disposition, had more than a local fame as an artist, any of his pictures being valuable works of art. He has a large circle of friends who will deeply sympathize with his widow."

1895 - *St. Catharines Standard* - August 12, 1895

Death Column - "DIED - MILLNER - In Grantham, Sunday, August 11th, 1895, Charles B. Millner Aged 90 years, funeral will take place on Wednesday 14th at 1:30 from the late residence corner Vine and Carlton Streets to the cemetery.

(Charles is buried in Victoria Lawn Cemetery - Section C - south side of the Queenston Street, west of the cemetery office along the first roadway, on the south side of the roadway under a large tree just before the Masonic Circle).

1895 - *Ontario Vital Statistics* - Death Registration (partial)

Died- City of St. Catharines; Cause of death -old age; physician - Dr. Greenwood, Religion -
Episcopalian; informant - J.B.MacIntyre, undertaker: occupation - artist

1897 - *Standard*, August 7, 1897, page 3

(small news story) -"While assisting in the erection of a memorial monument at the grave of the late C.B.MILLNER at Victoria Lawn Cemetery on Saturday, Hadley PHIPPS had his leg crushed. It will be several days before he will be able to be about again"

The beautiful large black stone transcription reads as follows:


At The St. Catharines Museum

Exhibit on until April 29: "From The Hands Of A Master" is a travelling exhibit that pays tribute to the work of the following artisans: the blacksmith, glass blower, weaver, quilter, violin maker, leather worker, and bookbinder. The hands of the artisan act on the raw material by calling upon certain elements to create an object of high quality & great beauty. Exhibit on until April 29: "Quilts - Craft And Heritage" on loan from the Waterloo County & Area Quilt Festival. In celebration of Black History Month, the exhibit also highlights quilts and needlework crafted by two local women.

Exhibit on from May 5 to July 22: "Fabricating; Stitching Ourselves Together" is an intimate autobiography of work, women and wedding dresses. The exhibit features 20 wedding dresses created by one woman over a forty-five year period and honours the seamstress while exploring larger issues of gender and generations.

The Big Barn To Disappear

Sadly we will soon see the demise of the big barn located on Pelham Road (just east of Vansickle Road). A new subdivision will soon appear here.



Buchanan House and Area

The Children's Discovery Center has reached an agreement with the City of St. Catharines to use the former Niagara College site on Niagara Street. The main house on the site was the home of Tom Buchanan in 1876. Most of the Buchanan family lived in the immediate area and had interests in fruit and vegetable farming. They sold their produce at the market and to hotels, particularly in Niagara – on-the-Lake. The family expanded into the green house business and were the first producers of the “English” cucumber. They continued to farm until 1916. Tom's son, Neil, lived in the house after his father died but was not very interested in farming. It is not known just when he moved from the farmhouse. Ivan Buchanan and his family still farmed in the area further down on Niagara Street. The City fathers bought the farm for a cemetery but changed their minds and sold it to the Canadian Department of Agriculture in 1928. For approximately 40 years the site was occupied by the Federal Government's Plant Pathology Laboratory, where much research on problems affecting Niagara's fruit industry was carried out. In 1967 with the completion of the new quarters at Vineland, the Niagara Street laboratory was closed. In 1972 the farm became Pearson Park and Niagara College leased the Buchanan House, a barn, Mountain House (a house built in 1930 for the Officer-in-Charge) and three greenhouses for use by its school of horticulture. The College vacated the property in April 1999 when they moved to their new Glendale Campus location. Buchanan house then sat empty and plans were underway to demolish it when the idea of a Children's Discovery Centre was put forward. The City has agreed to a lease of \$1.00 per year. The volunteers are now working on the arboretum and premises at 360 Niagara Street and plan on opening this October. They are seeking whatever support the citizens can give, so if you wish to get involved call the site office at 646-4365.

New Book - RIDLEY: A Canadian School

This is the story of Ridley College, one of Canada's leading coeducational boarding schools. It begins in 1888 with the vision of its first headmaster. It follows the school's development over the next 110 years through a disastrous fire in 1903, the Depression, two world wars, and into the global technological age. As the millennium turns, Ridley emerges as a vibrant institution holding fast to its traditions yet constantly forging new strategies to meet modern challenges. This story is more than institutional history. The story of Canada's own exciting development is woven into the text. Ridley's evolution reflects and sometimes contrasts with the evolution of the nation. Ridley graduates have become influential leaders in a wide variety of fields. Ridley has always emphasized the highest academic and social standards for its students. Behind these standards is the constant reminder of the needs of others in the school's motto, "May I be Consumed in Service." The vitality of Ridley's programs comes alive in the text, in the 150 photographs, and in the wealth of additional information in the attached CD-ROM. *(source: Ridley College Web Site)*

The book was launched on November 30, 2000. Co-authors are Paul Lewis (librarian, teacher and school archivist) and Richard Bradley (headmaster from 1971-81).
